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INDEPENDENT PRESIDENTS REPORT

As most members will know, this will be my final Independent President's Report to the Affiliated Clubs making up Swimming NT. My time has concluded in the role.

In 1966 I stood down from the blocks as a Northwest NSW Age Division Champion and State Representative swimmer, and now in 2022, I stand down as President of Swimming Northern Territory. As a young swimmer (many years ago) I never imagined a role in sport governance, but life finds pathways that constantly surprise! I think the latter has been more complex than the former but both very rewarding.

At the AGM I will be stepping down and a replacement will step up. Your Board continues to seek an Independent Chair, and conversations have been had with parties. I'm sure the Board will report on the process as developments unfold.

My time as Independent President has been interesting, busy, and rewarding. At a governance level, I have seen the sport pick itself up from dark times and overcome past hurdles. The future does look bright. As I consistently remark – none of this is due to my work – it has been due entirely to the hard working and committed club officials, volunteers, competitors, and SNTI Board members that accepted the challenge. It's easy to see challenges, but every challenge is mostly an opportunity. Indeed, there are challenges and opportunities ahead for us all.

I can reflect on the fact that the sport and the organisation is in a good place.

From an administration perspective, Ravin left us, and Rob has joined us. Recruitment was challenging, given the past and continuing employment markets – and we welcome Rob as our CEO. Rob brings with him a very strong understanding of the sport, great coaching capacity, and strong ethical values. He will be the face of greater development of the sport. Our greatest collective challenge is to grow the sport, retain financial viability, and support clubs. During the reporting period, we were advised Thomas Noblett was leaving – and he has now left. I personally thank Tom for his great contribution over the years. Tom has been a wonderful steady influence on the organisation, the sport, and the clubs. We wish him well in his new role. Further in this period, we developed and delivered an updated SNTI Constitution (thanks Mark for your great work) and managed to build a future opportunity for competitive swimmer number growth in Palmerston.

From a sporting perspective during this period, we managed to consolidate planning for and delivery of the **Australian Country Championship** as a major event in the NT. Recognition goes to the previous administration for seeding this dream. Dreams do come true if you try hard!



By the time of the AGM, the event will have come and gone. This will have been the largest and most high-profile event conducted by SNTI in its history. To the current administration goes my personal thanks and the thanks of the Board. I am fully aware of the hard work done by staff to deliver this event at grass roots. Information on the outcome of the event will be available (as I write) after its conclusion.

In closing, the 2021-2022 period has been one of consolidation for the sport, even if during this time there was significant change – including at Swimming Australia. I thank SNTI and the clubs for the confidence and support they have shown me during my tenure, and I wish the sport all the best for the future.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER REPORT

I am happy to present the 2021/2022 Annual Report. This will be my first report as Chief Executive Officer of Swimming Northern Territory.

I have been in this role since May 2022. I have been entrusted a position that has been well cared for in the past by Lee-Ann, Thomas and Ravin. The financial and development stability which has been carried through this 2021/2022 year has provided me a perfect launching pad for the future to carry the sport of swimming toward 2032.

The work which has been carried out by all the previous employees, has left us with a pathway toward the future. The focus from Swimming Australia as a National organisation has turned toward participation and increasing numbers throughout the sport of swimming. The promotion of swimming as not only a competitive option, will develop the sustainability of the sport into the future.

Swimming NT has experienced a similar level of total membership for the 2021 / 2022 financial year as it had in the previous year. Total membership decreased by 51 from747 to 696, however the positive outcome is that competitive swimmers increased in number from 382 to 425 during this period. The programs and initiatives during this season were focused on developing the sport in the NT and growing participation in our regional areas.

The continuation of these already successful programs, along with adding new programs, such as course delivery of behalf of Swim Coaches and Teachers Australia and further enhancements of our remote indigenous projects will only further enhance our profile in the community and ultimately raise the profile of our sport overall, thus improving participation numbers into the future.

An important part of our existence as a Peak Sporting Body, we rely heavily on our sponsorship and grant base. Some of our major contributors to our success were:



• Federal Government Project: Successful delivery of the Social Inclusion and Physical Activity program in the 8 identified Indigenous community hubs.

FINANCE

The challenges faced by Swimming Northern territory, is a similar challenge faced by all throughout the sporting sector

The Organisation is currently in a healthy financial position due to the sound financial management over the past couple of years.

2021 / 2022, reporting period has produced an operating surplus \$38,900.00 (with the inclusion of non-cash item of \$13.4K in depreciation expenses). This was all despite a reduced base line funding from Swimming Australia and Northern Territory Government over the past couple of years.

The net profit result for this financial year showed a sound financial platform base for us to continue building into the future. We will continue to adapt our business model to suit our program delivery, with the ultimate goal, that of promoting, building and sustaining our sport throughout the Northern Territory, is achieved well into the future.

VOLUNTEERS AND OFFICIALS

Our Volunteers and Technical Officials in Swimming Northern Territory play an integral part in our success story. These two categories of people are the base fundamental to the success of all our events throughout the year. Without the support base provided in this area from many people throughout the club membership and the wider community, we would not be able to function as a successful organisation.

We rely on a small number of dedicated volunteer and paid teaching staff to assist us in running and expanding our school swimming program delivery, these people, who are regular contributors in many ways to our programs, assist us in making these programs the successful model they are today. These programs are a way to the future in building participation and growth in our sport.

To all our club volunteers, coaches, parents, technical officials and any support staff of both clubs and swimmers personally, an acknowledgement to each and every one of you, as without the base functions of a successful club, the overall growth of the sport would not be sustainable.

BOARD

I would like to congratulate the current board on their leadership through this period. The Board of Management in any organisation of this size, play an integral part in supporting the staff employed to run the organisation. Without the support and guidance, when required, Swimming Northern Territory would not be the success story that it has been over the last couple of years.

Garry Lambert, our current independent chairperson, will be leaving the board at this AGM due to a move to the eastern states with his family. I would like to thank Garry personally for the guidance he has provided in the short time we have worked together. The relationship between and President and CEO is a very important one that can contribute greatly to the success of an organisation.

Also, a special thank you to Emily Knott, who I first met whilst coaching here in the territory. Emily has been a passionate contributor to the sport and I am sure that the path she chooses to take in Brisbane will be an active one in the sport and Emily will continue to have a positive impact on many swimmers and swimming families well into the future.

I look forward to an ongoing positive and supportive relationship with the Board, to assist us all achieve a positive outcome in the growth of the sport.

I see a successful future for the sport within the Northern Territory. Whilst we have the tyranny of distance and wide-open spaces, as a Territory Wide organisation, I see a sustainable long-term future promoting a sport that we are all very passionate about.

There will be new faces on the scene within our organisation, and the sport generally in the Northern Territory, as those who have contributed to the growth of the sport in the past, all move on to bigger and better things. This should not be seen as a backward step, or a time to dwell on the past, it is an opportunity for new and fresh ideas to reinvigorate the sport and grow exponentially into the Peak Sports Body that swimming should be in an island nation such as ours.

With the ongoing support of the Board of Directors, Club presidents, Parents and most importantly, the swimmers, I see a bright future on the horizon for our sport.

Traditionally we have been a small contributor to the sport at a National level, and whilst previously this may have meant we were perceived to be somewhat insignificant in the bigger picture, building on what has been achieved over the past few years by our predecessors, we are becoming more recognisable in the National swimming space. Through partnerships with our neighbors, Swimming Queensland and Swimming South Australia, these states have been, and will continue to be neighbors we can turn to for support and recognition.

I am confident that we can all work together to build on the success of the past achievements and deliver a sport which will become an active favorite for most Territorians.

I am looking forward to a bright and successful future.






2022 Swimming NT Open and Age Championships

While the season has had successes, it has also been a challenging one for the club. Mid way through the season saw the departure of our Head Coach Emily Knott and her family. Being the transient place Alice Springs can be, also saw many club families leave town around the same time, in turn also losing swim officials.

Over this past season, while we have seen swimmers leave the club, we have been able to maintain our sessions. We continue to run 9 with two of these sessions being a mini squad enabling new swimmers to transition from learn to swim to the requirements of squad training, along with Stroke & Technical skills.

We have been fortunate enough to have Emily continue to provide support to the club remotely and are grateful to have Nick Rickard and Sam Gollan step in as additional coaches, to share the load with myself.

ASSC have achieved the following successes throughout the season:

NT Short Course Championships were held in August 21 and back in Alice Springs for the first time in a while. Having this event held locally enabled quite a few of our swimmers the opportunity to compete and have family and friends attend, making their pb's and some swim records even more special. The club finished the event in 4th position.

Some of our club members provided invaluable support and assistance to Swimming NT and enabled the running of a smooth and successful event, special thanks to Emily Knott, Craig Markham, Dave & Jody Bloomer and Michelle Parker.

- Harrison Knott attended the NT Open Water Championships in Darwin in August and finished with Gold in the 5km race and finished second overall.
- Three of our club swimmers Harrison Knott, Hannah Markham and Lilly Bloomer were selected as part of the NT State Championship team. Unfortunately, due to Covid the event was cancelled, but Swimming NT were able to organise a development camp to Cairns in September 21. A fantastic experience was had, travelling as a team with other NT swimmers, training with another club, meeting a Paralympian and competing in North Queensland.
- A successful Katherine Birthday Carnival in October, with 13 club swimmers attending and some experiencing a competition meet with other NT swimmers for the first time. Alice Springs again proved they are worthy opponents, with a strong medal haul, age champions, a swim record and our successful march past earning the team a win and the trophy.



- Lilly Bloomer attended the Casuarina Storm Invitational in Darwin for the first time and returned with 5 medals and great PB's.
- The State Based National Age Challenge saw 8 of our swimmer's medal in this event.
- March 2022 saw a 7 member team head to Darwin for the NT Open & Age Championships and again showed just what our club and swimmers are made of, performing some outstanding swims, which resulted in a pb's, medal haul and finishing 4th from 9 teams.
- Lilly Bloomer was also selected as the NT Open & Age Championship Ambassador, a great honour for Lilly and for the Alice Springs Swimming Club.
- Five ASSC swimmers were selected to be a part of the NT School Sports team to represent
 the Northern Territory. Again due to Covid, this event did not take place, but we would like to

- Lilly Bloomer attended the SA State LC Championships, which was a great experience for Lilly, who walked away with pb's and a bronze in the 16yrs 50m breaststroke.
- In May we were able to hold a development clinic and with the support of Swimming NT a JX
 Clinic for our swimmers, with special guest Kurt Herzog. Both events were well attended by
 the club and fun was had by all.
- This season also saw 10 swimmers from our club achieve Australian Junior excellence (JX) awards with two achieving gold status - Thomas Markham and former club swimmer Joshua Knott, well done.

In the 2020-21 season, Casuarina Swimming Club demonstrated that strong clubs are not only measured by their sporting prowess, but also by their resilience. Our efforts to find a new head coach late in 2020 was made more difficult with the pandemic, but the Club was fortunate to have a group of dedicated coaches during the interim period. We were very grateful to have the support of our Life Member and interim head coach, Jac Stirrat, who coordinated the coaching team and worked hard to ensure our swimmers stayed in the water. Jac was also instrumental in getting the nutrition nights up and running where groups of swimmers would plan, shop and cook for over 20 of their team-mates. Jac was well supported by Julianne Osborne, Clare Labowitch, Jane Davies and Thomas Noblett. We could not have done it without their help, so a huge thank you to the coaching team! The resilience of our swimmers and our members ensured the Club was able to keep moving forward. I would also like to thank our Club Secretary, Lien Bui, who works quietly but tirelessly behind the scenes to ensure the smooth running of the club, even under difficult situations.

There were numerous highlights in 2020-21. The Club ran another successful Casuarina Storm Invitational, including a medley skins event for the first time. The Club participated in all swimming events offered in the NT - long course, short course and open water - with swimmers consistently performing well and medalling.

At the 2020 NT Short Course Championships our swimmers performed extremely well. The Club took home the Champion Male Trophy (Damian Culgan), the Champion Female Trophy (Rosanna Materazzo) and the Swimmer of the Meet (Andrew Materazzo). Damian, Rosanna and Andrew were rewarded with selection onto the NT team that competed at the 2020 Australian Virtual Short Course Championships in Sydney. This was a great opportunity for our swimmers who swam with some of the best swimmers in Australia and improved on their times.

2020 also saw the release of the Casuarina Aquatic & Leisure Centre Masterplan. The Club and its many supporters successfully campaigned to have the Masterplan redesigned and retain 8 lanes in the 50m pool (the original proposal was 5 lanes, we asked for 10). Thank you to all those in the swimming community who took the time to send in feedback on the Masterplan. It was great to see the swimming community come together on this issue.

In 2021, the Club sent a team to the SA Country Championships and we are grateful to Swimming SA for the opportunity to attend. The team of 7 swimmers - Damian Culgan, Andrew Materazzo, Rosanna Materazzo, Chloe Reader, Sam Reader, Kavisha Dona and Thenuki Dona - excelled at the Championships, finishing in 10th place overall. They brought home a combined total of 18 gold, 16 silver, 3 bronze, 11 SA County records, 4 NT records and 10 Club records. These swimmers showed great sportsmanship, supporting each other and cheering on all the NT swimmers throughout the meet – well done team!



More great results followed at the 2021 NT Long Course Championships where our swimmers gave 100% plus more in their races and showed great team spirit. The Club took home 6 Age Group Trophies (Samantha Mercader, Samuel Reader, Chloe Reader, Andrew Materazzo, Flynn White, Rosanna Materazzo), the Champion Female Trophy (Rosanna) and Swimmer of the Meet (Andrew).

On a national level we saw three swimmers make Australian Age Qualifying times. Andrew Materazzo qualified in the 50 free, 100 free and 200 free, and 5km open water; Flynn White in the 400 free and 5km open water; Rosanna Materazzo in the 5km open water. Well done to Andrew who represented the Club proudly at his first National event on the Gold Coast in April. Unfortunately, it was not possible to attend the 2021 Open Water Championships after lockdowns caused changes to the date and location.

Our hardworking Committee, parents, swimmers and supporters should be congratulated on another great swimming season. The Club has now secured a new head coach, Rob West, who brings significant experience and is looking to make a long-term impression on the Club and the competition.

The season started with a team of thirty swimmers heading down to Alice Springs to take part in the 2021 State Short Course Championships. There were multiple PB's and NT records broken during the meet. The highlight of the meet was Damian Culgan and Macey Sheridan winning the Male and Junior Female Champion and Macey taking the Swimmer of the Meet. To round of the short course season, we saw a small team of 5 swimmers head across to Broome for the Kimberly Short Course Championships with the main highlight being Sienna winning Senior female of the meet.

Ending September also saw 10 of our Darwin swimmers head across to Cairns for a Swimming NT Training camp. The 40th Birthday of the Katherine Carnival saw our largest team heading down to compete. We were fortunate enough to walk away with the Club trophy as well as multiple age group champions Rounding off the year the club sent a team of 13 to compete at the QLD State Championships. The team did incredibly well with multiple swimmers making finals every day. The highlight of the meet was Logan Rieck getting a bronze medal in the 200m Backstroke.

The culmination of the season came at the NT Open and Age Champions in March 2022. The club took out the Overall Club Champions of the meet. There were also many notable individual performances by Freya Chapman, Macey Sheridan, Melissa Roberts, Izzy Demasi Chapman, Bella Yates, Sienna Walo, Cole Roberts, Logan Rieck, Sampson Gee and Zayne Mallet for winning their age group championships. Including Macy Sheridan for the Champion Distance Female and Logan Rieck for the Champion Distance Male and the Swimmer of the Meet.

Gee & James Smith. The team performed very well against the best from around the county with two James (1500m Free) & Sampson (200m Free) finishing 7th for their age group. As well as having 2 swimmers attend the 2022 Australian Swimming Championships, Tamsyn Walo & Sienna Walo. We saw Sienna finish 5th in the Women's 17-19 age final.

Outside of the pool, the club were a finalist in Junior Team nominations for the Northern Territory Sports Awards for 2022. This is an annual award run by the Department of Territory Families, Housing and Communities that recognises achievements of athletes, coaches, sporting officials and volunteers in the Northern Territory.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The incorporated association has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of preparation

In the Committee Members' opinion, the incorporated association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements.

These are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purposes of complying with the Northern Territory legislation Associations Act 2003 and associated regulations. The Committee Members have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members of Swimming Northern Territory Incorporated.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors', AASB 1048 'Interpretation of Standards' and AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures', as appropriate for not-for profit oriented entities.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for, where applicable, the revaluation of financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income, investment properties, certain classes of property, plant and equipment and derivative financial instruments.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the incorporated association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Revenue recognition

The incorporated association recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the incorporated association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements. If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the incorporated association is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

Sales revenue

Events, fundraising and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations and sponsorship

Donations and sponsorship income is recognised at the time the pledge is made.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Income tax

As the incorporated association is a tax exempt institution in terms of subsection 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

The incorporated association has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Inventories

Stock on hand is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises of purchase and delivery costs, net of rebates and discounts received or receivable.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment over their expected useful lives as follows:

Buildings 25 years
Motor Vehicles 3-4 years
Plant and equipment 3-8 years

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the incorporated association. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the incorporated association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including annual leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Note 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the incorporated association for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2022. The incorporated association has not yet assessed the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations.

Note 2. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Allowance for expected credit losses

The allowance for expected credit losses assessment requires a degree of estimation and judgement. It is based on the lifetime expected credit loss, grouped based on days overdue, and makes assumptions to allocate an overall expected credit loss rate for each group. These assumptions include recent sales experience and historical collection rates.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The incorporated association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Swimming Northern Territory Incorporated (the "Association"), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2022, the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, the statement of changes in equity for the year then ended, and notes to the financial report, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the Statement by Management Committee.

In our opinion the accompanying financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Association as at 30 June 2022 and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the basis of accounting described in note 1.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities* for the audit of the Financial Report section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

Emphasis of matter - Basis of accounting
